<b>Motor vehicles, cars, motorcycles</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The transit document (i.e. B/L)</li> <li>• Invoice or purchase contract that shows the actual purchase sum as well as any possible freight invoice and documentation of any possible other fees that have accrued to the motor vehicle before it passes the Norwegian border (for example, insurance)</li> <li>• Original foreign registration document, possibly a Certificate of Conformity (COC). When importing new vehicles where the Certificate of Conformity is submitted, you can in most cases pay the motor vehicle tax simultaneously with the VAT.</li> </ul> <p>If you wish to pay the VAT immediately when you cross the border, you must pursue this directly at the border crossing concerned.</p>	<p>You may not import a motor vehicle without paying duties or taxes into Norway in connection with moving from a different country.</p> <p>This applies irrespective of nationality and where you are moving from.</p> <p>However, you may apply for temporary permission to drive a foreign-registered motor vehicle for up to 14 days in connection with moving to or from Norway. <b>Import of recreational boat</b>	<p>You may bring you recreational boat to Norway without paying duties or taxes if the following conditions are met:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• You must have resided abroad continuously for at least five years</li> </ul>	<p>All boats with a hull length from 2.5 to 24 meters and water scooters must be CE marked. Excluded are boats that were used in a EU/EEA country before 16 June 1998. 	<p>immediately prior to arrival.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The boat may not be larger than 15 meters in length.</li> <li>You must have owned the boat for at least 12 months before arrival and used it abroad for the same period (12 months).</li> <li>You must bring the boat to Norway within one year after arrival at the latest.</li> <li>You must remain in possession of the boat for at least two years following customs clearance before it can be sold or transferred.</li> </ul> <p>These conditions must be documented when you import the boat. The application must be submitted to the customs region to which you move.</p>	<p>meets the safety requirements for the boat type. Engines must initially be CE marked by the manufacturer.</p>	
<b>Dogs and Cats</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Import Licence.</li> <li>Approved ID Marking.</li> <li>Rabies vaccination by means of an approved vaccine, together with an antibody test. Dogs must also be vaccinated against leptospirosis as well as distemper.</li> <li>Health certificate together with vaccination certificates.</li> <li>Certificate of deworming against echinococcus.</li> </ul>	<p>The customs authorities at border crossings will check import licence, identification marking and vaccination certificates. These regulations apply only to the importation of dogs and cats from EEC/EFTA countries. Animals imported from non-EEC/EFTA countries must go into quarantine for 4 to 6 months.</p>	<p>Your agent can give you information about the import licence and where to apply for it. The ID-Mark must be a legible tattoo, or an approved form of implanted microchip. Before they can be vaccinated against rabies, dogs must be at least 3 months old and cats at least 14 months old. Not earlier than 120 days after the vaccination, a blood sample must be taken for antibody testing. The vaccinations against distemper and leptospirosis must be done at least one month before importation. Cats and dogs must be dewormed against echinococcus within 10 days prior importation. An approved vet must sign the health certificate not earlier than 10 days prior to importation.</p>
<b>Alcoholic beverages, spirits, wine, etc. in minimum quantities</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Special clearance required.</li> <li>Import permit from the Ministry of Drugs prior to arrival.</li> </ul>	<p>Try to avoid including alcoholic beverages of any kind into the household goods shipment. Extremely high taxes and duties will apply, even on small quantities. If shipper insists on shipping alcoholic</p>	<p>In most cases, cost is greater than current retail price.</p>

		beverages place all boxes at the door of the container for easy access, and make a detailed list of: Brand, Volume, Year and alcoholic strength.	
<b>Weapons</b>	Local police must grant permits.	Normal weapons and ammunition generally admitted, subject to police permission, and, normally, to the importer being member of a hunting and fishing club.	Ask for permit in due time in order to avoid they are retained by customs until permits granted. Without permission from the Police, weapons will be confiscated.
<b>Wood</b>		According to the amendments imported wood packaging material and wood used to support cargo at import (“dunnage”) must be treated and marked according to ISPM No.15 (FAO International Standard for Phytosanitary Measures No. 15 on Guidelines for regulating wood packaging material in international trade).	
<b>Live plants</b>		Must obtain certification from the Plant and Wildlife Department from country of origin that plants are healthy.	
<b>Prohibited articles</b>		Narcotics, fresh meat, explosives, automatic guns, spirits containing over 60% vol. alcohol, prescription medicines, some vitamins and some “pets” (reptiles and threatened species).
